ART AND MULTIMEDIA PROJECTS

Illustrating the Vernal Pool Food Web

Have students create a detailed food web that includes organisms from the book: spadefoot tadpoles, fairy shrimp, algae, raccoons, and herons. This visual representation helps students understand energy transfer and the delicate balance of temporary ecosystems. It can be drawn on poster paper or created digitally and presented as part of an ecology unit.

Book Trailer or Podcast Episode

For tech-savvy classrooms, students can produce a 60-second book trailer that captures the suspense and beauty of the story. Alternatively, they can record a podcast episode where they interview a “character” from the book (played by a classmate) about the events. Map of Ben’s New World
