Time-bound

I will take the SAT on May 5th. My weekly practice tests will run from now until the week before the exam. I will complete my first diagnostic test this Saturday and my final practice test on April 28th.

Action Steps

- Week 1-2: Complete diagnostic tests and identify weak topics.
- Week 3-6: Focus on algebra skill-building using Khan

Academy (20 minutes daily) and practice questions (25 minutes daily).

- Week 7-10: Shift to full practice tests every Saturday and review errors on Sunday.
- Week 11-12: Focus on test-taking strategies and time management.

Potential Obstacles and Solutions
