Understanding this narrative arc can help you play the piece with more feeling, even with just letter notes.

Complete Humpty Dumpty Piano Notes Letters (Right Hand)

The following is the most common and widely accepted arrangement of "Humpty Dumpty" for the right hand. The notes in parentheses indicate a held note (a half note or dotted half note in the original score). Play the tune at a slow, steady pace, counting "1-2-3" for each measure. The measure numbers are

provided for easy reference.

Phrase 1: Humpty Dumpty Sat on a Wall

- Measure 1: C - E - G (A) - G
- Measure 2: E - C - D - E - F - E - D
- Measure 3: C - E - G (A) - G
- Measure 4: E - C - D - E - F - E - C

Phrase 2: All the King's Horses...

- Measure 5: D - F - A (G) - F
- Measure 6: E - C - D - E - F - G - A
- Measure 7: C - E - G (A) - G
- Measure 8: E - C - D - E - F - E - (C)

Important Note on Timing: The letter sequences above are the melodic notes. For the rhythm, think of it this way: The first three notes of the song (C, E, G) are usually eighth notes (quick, light), followed by a longer note (A). Practice saying the words as you play: "C-E-G-Aaaah G..." This rhythmic connection is the key to making it sound like music, not just random notes. The final note in each phrase is typically held for a longer duration.

Left Hand Accompaniment: Simple Chords for Humpty

Once your right hand is comfortable with the melody, you can add a simple left-hand accompaniment to make the piece sound fuller. The easiest way to do this is by playing single bass notes or simple chords on the strong beats (beats 1 and sometimes 3 of each 3-beat measure). For "Humpty Dumpty" in C Major, you only need two chords: C Major (C-E-G) and G Major (G-B-D). The chord changes happen slowly, often every two measures.

Chord Progression for Humpty Dumpty:

- **Measures 1-4 (first phrase):** Play a C Major chord (C-E-G) on beat 1 of measure 1. You can play it again on beat 1 of measure 3.
- **Measures 5-6 (start of second phrase):** Play a G Major chord (G-B-D) on beat 1 of measure 5.
- **Measures 7-8 (end of song):** Play a C Major chord (C-E-G) on beat 1 of measure 7 and hold it through the end.

To simplify even further, you can play just the root note of the chord (C and G) with your left hand pinky. This is an excellent first step before attempting full chords. Playing the root note C on the C below middle C, and the root note G on the G below that, creates a solid and pleasing foundation for your right-hand melody of **Humpty Dumpty piano notes letters**.

Common Mistakes and How to Avoid Them

When learning with **Humpty Dumpty piano notes letters**, a few common pitfalls can hinder progress. Being aware of them will save you time and frustration.

4. **Not Counting Aloud:** The letter notes tell you which key to press, but they do not tell you rhythm. You must actively count the beats. Without counting, the notes are just a meaningless sequence of sounds. Connect the letters to the

rhythm by tapping your foot or saying "1-2-3" as you play.

From Letters to Sheet Music: The Next Step

Once you have mastered the **Humpty Dumpty piano notes letters** and can play the piece comfortably with both hands, you have conquered a major milestone. Congratulations! The next logical step is to make the transition to reading standard sheet music. You will find that your experience with letter notes gives you a huge advantage. You already know the melody by heart.
