attention to authenticity, casting actors who looked and acted like real fifth-graders. The result is a film that feels timeless, resisting the dated CGI that plagues other 2000s family films.

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Katherine Paterson's novel is spare and lyrical, and the movie wisely expands without betraying the book's spirit. One notable addition is the character of Miss Edmunds, who is barely present in the novel. 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### CRITICAL RECEPTION AND BOX OFFICE

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Upon release, **A Bridge to Terabithia movie** surprised critics with its emotional intelligence. It holds an 85% approval rating on Rotten Tomatoes, with the consensus praising its "respect for its young audience" and its refusal to condescend. Roger Ebert gave

it three-and-a-half stars, calling it "a story about imagination, friendship, and the unexpected tragedy that can strike any childhood." The film earned over \$137 million worldwide against a \$20 million budget, a commercial success that proved there was an appetite for thoughtful children's cinema.
