Problem 4: Greater Than with Expression

Solve: $|3x + 2| \geq 7$

Solution: Rewrite as $3x + 2 \leq -7$ or $3x + 2 \geq 7$.

First inequality: $3x + 2 \leq -7 \rightarrow 3x \leq -9 \rightarrow x \leq -3$

Second inequality: $3x + 2 \geq 7 \rightarrow 3x \geq 5 \rightarrow x \geq 5/3$

Solution: $x \leq -3$ or $x \geq 5/3$. Interval: $(-\infty, -3] \cup [5/3, \infty)$.

Problem 5: Special Case – No Solution

Solve: $|x + 4| < -2$

Solution: The absolute value is always nonnegative (≥ 0). It can never be less than a negative number. Therefore, there is no solution. Answer: $\emptyset$ (empty set).

Problem 6: Special Case – All Real Numbers

Solve: $|5 - x| > -1$

Solution: The absolute value is always ≥ 0 , and 0 is always greater than -1. So the inequality holds for every real number. Answer: all real numbers, or $(-\infty, \infty)$.

COMMON MISTAKES TO AVOID
