The Riemann Hypothesis is not just a technical problem; it is a symbol of the mystery at the heart of mathematics. Generations of mathematicians have attempted to prove it, and many deep results in analytic number theory have been discovered in the process—though the hypothesis itself remains unyielding. Riemann's 1859 paper was barely eight pages long, but it shaped an entire field for over 160 years and counting.

THE RIEMANN INTEGRAL: RIGOR IN CALCULUS

Riemann also made fundamental contributions to analysis, particularly in the theory of integration. The Riemann integral, which is still taught in introductory calculus courses worldwide, was his creation. Riemann also introduced the concept of the Riemann sphere, which is the complex plane compactified by adding a single point at infinity. This idea allowed mathematicians to treat infinity as a regular point and to study functions on the entire extended complex plane. The Riemann sphere is now a standard tool in complex analysis and is essential for understanding Möbius transformations and other geometric properties of the plane.
