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FROM RAGS TO RICHES: THE UNFORGETTABLE JACKIE CHAN BIOGRAPHY

Tucker provided the fast-paced verbal comedy while Jackie provided the physical comedy, creating a perfect buddy-cop dynamic that crossed racial and cultural barriers. He followed this with hits like *Shanghai Noon* (2000) and *The Tuxedo* (2002). While Hollywood films often "toned down" his stunt
